- 1.1 The designated State unit (DSU) eligible to submit the State Plan for Independent Living (SPIL or the plan) and authorized under State law to perform the functions of the State under the State Independent Living Services (SILS) and Centers for Independent Living (CIL) programs is **Kansas Rehabilitation Services (KRS)** (insert name of DSU). *34 CFR 76.104(a)(1) and (2); 34 CFR 364.22(a)*
- 1.2 The separate State agency eligible to submit the plan and authorized under State law to provide vocational rehabilitation (VR) services to individuals who are blind is **KS REHABILITATION SERVICES (KRS)** (insert name of separate State agency). - 1.3 The Statewide Independent Living Council (SILC) that meets the requirements of section 705 of the Act and is authorized to perform the functions outlined in section 705(c) of the Act in the State is **STATEWIDE INDEPENDENT LIVING COUNCIL OF KANSAS, SILCK** (insert name of SILC). *34 CFR 364.21(a)*
- 1.4 The DSU and, if applicable, the separate State agency authorized to provide VR services to individuals who are blind, and the SILC are authorized to jointly develop, sign and submit this SPIL on behalf of the State, and have adopted or otherwise formally approved the SPIL. *34 CFR 76.104(a)(7); 34 CFR 364.20(c) and (d)*
- 1.5 The DSU, and, if applicable, the separate State agency authorized to provide VR services to individuals who are blind, may legally carry out each provision of the plan and will comply with all applicable Federal statutes and regulations in effect with respect to the three-year period it receives funding under the SPIL. *34 CFR 76.104; 34 CFR 80.11(c)*
- 1.6 The SPIL is the basis for State operation and administration of the program. All provisions of the SPIL plan are consistent with State law. *34 CFR 76.104(a)(4) and (8)*
- 1.7 The representative(s) of the DSU and, if applicable, of the separate State agency authorized to provide VR services to individuals who are blind, who has/have the authority under State law to receive, hold, and disburse Federal funds made available under the SPIL and to submit the SPIL jointly with the SILC chairperson is/are: **Chris Owens** (Name of SILC Chairperson) and **Michael Donnelly** (Name of DSU director). *34 CFR 76.104(a)(5) and (6)*

Section 2: SPIL Development

2.1 The plan shall be reviewed and revised not less than once every three years, to ensure the existence of appropriate planning, financial support and coordination, and other assistance to appropriately address, on a statewide and comprehensive basis, the needs in the State for:

- The provision of State independent living services;
- The development and support of a statewide network of centers for independent living; and
- Working relationships between programs providing independent living services and independent living centers, the vocational rehabilitation program established under title I, and other programs providing services for individuals with disabilities. *34 CFR 364.20(f)*

2.2 The DSU and SILC conduct public meetings to provide all segments of the public, including interested groups, organizations and individuals, an opportunity to comment on the State plan prior to its submission to the Commissioner and on any revisions to the approved State plan. *34 CFR 20(g)(1)*

2.3 The DSU and SILC establish and maintain a written description of procedures for conducting public meetings in accordance with the following requirements:

The DSU and SILC shall provide:

- Appropriate and sufficient notice of the public meetings (that is, at least 30 days prior to the public meeting through various media available to the general public, such as newspapers and public service announcements, and through specific contacts with appropriate constituency groups and organizations identified by the DSU and SILC);
- Reasonable accommodation to individuals with disabilities who rely on alternative modes of communication in the conduct of the public meetings, including providing sign language interpreters and audio-loops; and
- Public meeting notices, written material provided prior to or at the public meetings, and the approved State plan in accessible formats for individuals who rely on alternative modes of communication. *34 CFR 364.20(g)(2)*

2.4 At the public meetings to develop the State plan, the DSU and SILC identify those provisions in the SPIL that are State-imposed requirements beyond what would be required to comply with the regulations in 34 CFR parts 364, 365, 366, and 367. *34 CFR 364.20(h)*

2.5 The DSU will seek to incorporate into and describe in the State plan any new methods or approaches for the provision of IL services to older individuals who are

blind that are developed under a project funded under chapter 2 of title VII of the Act and that the DSU determines to be effective. *34 CFR 364.28*

- 2.6 The DSU and SILC actively consult, as appropriate, in the development of the State plan with the director of the Client Assistance Program (CAP) authorized under section 112 of the Act. *34 CFR 364.20(e)*

Section 3: Independent Living Services

- 3.1 The State, directly or through grants or contracts, will provide IL services with Federal, State, or other funds. *34 CFR 364.43(b)*
- 3.2 Independent living services shall be provided to individuals with significant disabilities in accordance with an independent living plan mutually agreed upon by an appropriate staff member of the service provider and the individual, unless the individual signs a waiver stating that such a plan is unnecessary. *34 CFR 364.43(c)*
- 3.3 All service providers will use formats that are accessible to notify individuals seeking or receiving IL services under chapter 1 of title VII about:
- (a) The availability of the CAP authorized by section 112 of the Act;
 - (b) The purposes of the services provided under the CAP; and
 - (c) How to contact the CAP. *34 CFR 364.30*
- 3.4 Participating service providers meet all applicable State licensure or certification requirements. *34 CFR 365.31(c)*

Section 4: Eligibility

- 4.1 Any individual with a significant disability, as defined in 34 CFR 364.4(b), is eligible for IL services under the SILS and CIL programs authorized under chapter 1 of title VII of the Act. Any individual may seek information about IL services under these programs and request referral to other services and programs for individuals with significant disabilities, as appropriate. The determination of an individual's eligibility for IL services under the SILS and CIL programs meets the requirements of 34 CFR 364.51. *34 CFR 364.40(a), (b) and (c)*
- 4.2 Service providers apply eligibility requirements without regard to age, color, creed, gender, national origin, race, religion or type of significant disability of the individual applying for IL services. *34 CFR 364.41(a)*
- 4.3 Service providers do not impose any State or local residence requirement that excludes any individual who is present in the State and who is otherwise eligible for IL services from receiving IL services. *34 CFR 364.41(b)*

Section 5: Staffing Requirements

5.1 Service provider staff includes personnel who are specialists in the development and provision of IL services and in the development and support of centers. *34 CFR 364.23(a)*

5.2 To the maximum extent feasible, a service provider makes available personnel able to communicate:

(1) With individuals with significant disabilities who rely on alternative modes of communication, such as manual communication, nonverbal communication devices, Braille or audio tapes, and who apply for or receive IL services under title VII of the Act and (2) in the native languages of individuals with significant disabilities whose English proficiency is limited and who apply for or receive IL services under title VII of the Act. *34 CFR 364.23(b)*

5.3 Service providers establish and maintain a program of staff development for all classes of positions involved in providing IL services and, if appropriate, in administering the CIL program. The staff development programs emphasize improving the skills of staff directly responsible for the provision of IL services, including knowledge of and practice in the IL philosophy. *34 CFR 364.24*

5.4 All recipients of financial assistance under parts B and C of chapter 1 of title VII of the Act will take affirmative action to employ and advance in employment qualified individuals with significant disabilities on the same terms and conditions required with respect to the employment of individuals with disabilities under section 503 of the Act. *34 CFR 364.31*

Section 6: Fiscal Control And Fund Accounting

6.1 All recipients of financial assistance under parts B and C of chapter 1 of title VII of the Act will comply with applicable EDGAR fiscal and accounting requirements and will adopt those fiscal control and fund accounting procedures as may be necessary to ensure the proper disbursement of and accounting for those funds. *34 CFR 364.34*

Section 1: Goals, Objectives and Activities

1.1 Goals and Mission – 34 CFR 364.42(b)(1)

Kansas' mission is to advocate for and achieve independence, choice, equal access, equal opportunity and empowerment for individuals with disabilities regardless of age.

Our overall goal is to maximize the leadership, empowerment, independence, and productivity of individuals with disabilities, and the integration and full inclusion of individuals with disabilities into the mainstream of society.

Kansas will:

Goal 1: Increase availability of independent living core services statewide.

Objective 1: Educate policymakers at state and national level about need to increase base funding for Centers for Independent Living to \$500,000 by 2010.

Objective 2: Support Independent Living Day at the Capitol in FY 08, 09 and 2010.

Goal 2: Increase outreach and public awareness to build community capacity to unserved /underserved populations in local areas through special projects grants.

Objective 1: Kansas Rehabilitation Services (KRS) and the Kansas SILC (SILCK) will facilitate an RFP committee to review and award

Title VII, Part B grants based on input gathered from public hearings to focus on un/underserved populations.

Objective 2: KRS will administer and monitor Title VII, Part B grant funds and outcomes. SILCK will provide input regarding SPIL priorities.

****Public comment was made specific to striking this goal and allow the use of part B funds for general CIL operations. The portion which reads “Increase outreach and public awareness to build community capacity to unserved/underserved populations” could be added to Goal One****

Goal 3: Increase participation in the workforce by people with disabilities.

Objective 1: Provide outreach and education to increase public awareness about Kansas Medicaid Buy-in program, Working Healthy, and the services available through the KRS by participating in the Kansas Disability Caucus in 2009.

Objective 2: Provide outreach and transition services to youth in the community in order to deliver skills necessary to enter the workforce including but not limited to: building self-esteem, problem solving skills, self-advocacy skills, knowledge of community resources, goal setting; exploration of career opportunities as well as labor market and educational requirements through linkages to KYEA, workforce centers, schools and other community partners, while increasing youth participation in the Disability Caucus.

Goal 4: Increase the enforcement of existing civil rights laws and the advancement of the civil rights of people with disabilities.

Objective 1: Support and advance the civil rights of people with disabilities by proposing at least one policy change or piece of legislation based on input received at regional public hearings each year that will address this goal for 2011, 2012, 2013.

Objective 2: Provide training at the Kansas Disability Caucus (2009) and the Independent Living Conference (2012) to promote and maximize independent living in family, community or employment to a minimum of 200 persons each year for 2011, 2012 and 2013.

Goal 5: Work to increase the availability of affordable, accessible, integrated housing.

Objective 1: CILS will identify and work with local housing entities and authorities to advocate for the needs for accessible and affordable housing options.

Objective 2: The SILCK will coordinate with CILS to ensure representation of statewide issues/needs specific to accessible and affordable housing options at state level housing entity meetings.

Objective 3: CILS and SILCK will coordinate to provide outreach to contractors, builders, developers, and architects, as well as the schools (colleges, universities, and technical schools) who train persons in the building industry about the importance of and marketability of universal design.

Goal 6: Work to increase the availability of affordable, accessible integrated transportation , specifically intercity travel.

Objective 1: CILS will interact with their local and regional transportation authorities and other providers to address the need for affordable and accessible integrated transportation between cities.

Objective 2: SILCK will ensure coordinated representation of this issue to statewide transportation entities and interface with Kansas University Transportation Center as appropriate.

In the February 15, 2010 public hearing attendees requested continued specific outreach to the following communities: Native American populations, youth with disabilities, the GLBT community (gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender) and victims of sexual and domestic violence . Added to this list during public input are the deaf community, psychiatric survivors and the mental health community, persons who are blind and low vision. The Kansas underserved and unserved IL

populations targeted for minority outreach efforts include but are not limited to the aforementioned communities.

1. CIL staff will maintain contact with the Tribal Councils to work together to establish IL services, possibly through a satellite/branch office.
2. CIL staff will maintain contact with KCSDV (Kansas Coalition against Sexual and Domestic Violence) to conduct outreach and provide information about IL services to victims of domestic violence with disabilities.
3. CIL staff will contact Kansas Youth Empowerment Academy (KYEA) to conduct outreach and provide information about IL services to young people with disabilities.
4. CIL staff will initiate and maintain contact with ReachOut USA to conduct outreach and provide information about IL services to the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender community.

will further the SPIL objectives.

Chapter 1 Part B funds in the amount of \$146,000 [131,400, \$14,600 state match], and \$100,000 (Title I, I&E funds) will be used to fund the resource plan for SILCK. \$183,124 [152,484 federal and \$16,943 state match] Federal and State, Part B funds will be used to fund the special projects grants to increase outreach, public awareness and community capacity building to unserved and underserved populations.[Note: the above statement is subject to change depending on comment specific to Goal 2] Chapter 1 Part C (\$784,789[859,070]), Social Security Reimbursement (\$400,000 [424,188]) and state general funds (\$1,719,307 [575,812]) will fund the state's network of centers for independent living.

Chapter 2 Older Blind funds (\$307,126 [293,182federal and \$32,646 state match]) will provide independent living services through the state KAN-SAIL program.

1.3 B(2) Describe efforts to coordinate Federal and State funding for centers and IL services, including the amounts, sources and purposes of the funding to be coordinated.

SILCK, KRS, KAN-SAIL and the CILs are committed to fostering cooperation and coordination to avoid unnecessary duplication with federal, state, and local programs.

SILCK, KRS, KAN-SAIL and the CILs ensure coordination and cooperation by which each other and other providers of IL or closely related services at the federal, state, county, municipal and public/private sector levels. Representatives of KRS and the CIL's participate on SILCK, State Rehabilitation Council, and will visit and interact with staff from the other organizations. When appropriate, consumers the various programs and each agency provides information to consumers about other programs.

The amounts of funding dedicated to each are shown in the financial table above and were completed with the assumption that Title VII and state funding sources would remain stable.

1.4A Describe how the SPIL objectives are consistent with and further the purpose of chapter 1 of title VII of the Act as stated in section 701 of the Act and 34 CFR 364.2.

The road to empowerment includes individual and systems change. The SPIL includes goals that promote individual and systems change. Systems change in the SPIL includes further de-medicalization, de-institutionalization, strengthened public policies for equal access and further utilization of individual and system advocacy. Individual change in the SPIL includes the use of peer support, individual advocacy, information and referral and independent living skills training. Kansas also will evaluate existing programs to determine their effectiveness, and then encourage redirection of resources to provide optimum opportunities for people with disabilities.

1.4B Describe how, in developing the SPIL objectives, the DSU and the SILC considered and incorporated, where appropriate, the priorities and objectives established by centers for independent living under section 725(c)(4) of the Act.

Three initial focus groups were held at the Centers for Independent Living (CILs) to gather input for the new three-year State Plan for Independent Living in 2007. The Kansas Disability Caucus held in 2009 was attended by over 600 Kansans with disabilities where input was gathered. Additionally, KRS and the SILCK hosted a statewide public hearing, in person and by teleconference including 11 sites on February 15, 2010; 44 persons were in attendance. It is the intention of the SILCK and the DSU to continue work together in the development of the SPIL. The DSU continues to remain active on the SILCK board..

SILCK also provided opportunity to comment on the plan through the SILCK's web site.

A compilation of priorities and common themes from the focus groups and the planning session are as follows: (1) increased availability of core IL services statewide; (2) the enforcement of existing civil rights laws and the advancement of the civil rights for people with disabilities; (3) public awareness to reduce stigma and increase understanding of people with disabilities within local communities;(4) increase participation in the workforce by people with disabilities.

Before being finalized, the draft three-year plan was distributed to all of the centers for independent living for review.

SILCK, KRS, KAN-SAIL and the CILs will ensure coordination and cooperation with other providers of IL or closely related services at the federal, state, county, municipal and public/private sector levels. The Department of Social and Rehabilitation, the Department of Aging, Kansas Native American 121 Project and the Kansas Commission on Disability Concerns staff serve on the SILCK, attend the Kansas Disability Caucus, and visits and interacts with CIL staff.

Kansas coordinates with the Dept. of Special Education, universities, developmental disability agencies, public health entities, Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Department of Health and Environment, state organizations and agencies handling housing, transportation and veteran's programs and finally with KRS, including the older blind services. Kansas works diligently to ensure no unnecessary duplication occurs by referring consumers to other programs when consumer needs require, and through formal and informal interface between service providers such as, community fairs, peer support groups and state conferences.

1.7 Independent Living Services for Individuals who are Older Blind – 34 CFR 364.28

Describe how the DSU seeks to incorporate into and describe in the State plan any new methods or approaches for the provision of IL services to older individuals who are blind that are developed under the Older Individuals who are Blind program and that the DSU determines to be effective.

The Independent Living Older Blind program, known as Kan-SAIL, is for seniors 55 and older with visual impairments. On January 14, 2010 KRS

brought together a diverse group of stakeholders to provide input regarding the future delivery of independent living services to the older blind population. Additional information was obtained during the February 15, 2010, State Plan for Independent Living Public hearing. Drawing from these meetings, Kansas makes a firm commitment to have a plan implemented by October 1, 2010. This plan will ensure Consumers will have statewide access to comprehensive services, services will be consumer controlled and individualized, and services will be community-based.

The DSU awards state IL funds in the amount of \$ 575,812 SFY 11 among the network of 12 Centers for Independent Living as a grant with the requirements that the recipient comply with requirements of TITLE VII, Chapter 1, Part C regulations. Eligibility for services will be determined by the CIL.

3.1 Existing Network – 34 CFR 364.25

Kansas currently has a network of thirteen CIL's. Three Title VII, Part C funded Centers are located in Topeka, Lawrence and Hays. These Centers have received federal funding since 1979-80 in the amount of \$753,332. Another two CILs were more recently awarded Federal Title VII, C funds: Three Rivers in Wamego (\$37,034); and, Southeast Kansas Independent Living Resource Center (SKIL) in Parsons (\$68,702); Total Title VII, Part C funds in Kansas is \$859,070.

State General Funds (SGF) independent living funds in the amount of \$575,812 SFY11 and an additional 424,188 in Social Security Reimbursement funds also support the Kansas' CIL network. Total state and federal funds supporting Independent Living in Kansas is: \$2,617,679 SFY 11

Another federally funded, Title VII, Part C Center, The Whole Person Inc. is established as a Missouri corporation. While this federal grant originates from Missouri, the CIL targets 37% of their federal funds to serve two counties in the Kansas City metropolitan area (Johnson and Wyandotte). The Whole Person, Inc. does not receive any SGF funding and is not included in the Kansas SPIL.

All 105 Kansas counties are provided core independent living services through a combination of state and federal funding.

Compliance with Section 725 of the Rehabilitation Act is required of all Centers for Independent Living operating in Kansas regardless of their funding sources.

3.2 Expansion of Network – 34 CFR 364.25

Kansas recognizes all counties as underserved, based on comparative data from the 2000 census and the FFY 2009 704 part one document from all 12 CILs as received by KRS. Within each network CIL's (all 12 state and federally funded centers) catchment area that on average 6.15 percent of the population with a disability is receiving services.

Kansas will continue to support the development of a network of centers through the following activities:

- 1. Educating policymakers of the need for additional state and federal funding to bring all CILs to adequate base funding levels.**
- 2. Using available resources for the provision of technical assistance to build additional capacity within the Kansas CILs.**

In the instance of a loss of funding first priority will be to

- 1. reestablish funding to FFY 2010 funding levels**
- 2. If all CILs in the network are at FFY 10 funding levels; funds will be distributed incrementally to Centers to reach a base funding level of \$300,000**
- 3. When all CILs reach a base funding level of \$300,000 any additional funds will be distributed equally among all CILs in the network.**

In the event of additional long-term federal funding Kansas agrees all centers not receiving Part C funding have the right to compete for new long-term sustainable federal Part C funding to serve their state grant catchment area.

The SILC and the DSU have no plans to establish new centers unless
(a) a strong expression of need arises from the consumers and community in a given area,
(b) the area can feasibly support a new center, and
(c) additional funding becomes available from state and/or federal sources. Kansas' emphasis at this point is to encourage centers to serve their catchment areas more thoroughly and effectively as additional funds become available.

PLAN FOR THE PROVISION OF RESOURCES TO THE SILCK BUDGET

The Statewide Independent Living Council of Kansas, Inc. (SILCK) was established as a not-for-profit corporation to coordinate the functions related to the planning, monitoring, and evaluation of the State Plan for Independent Living (SPIL) as described in Section 705 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended. The SILCK will maintain staff and an office commensurate to the efforts necessary to carry out the work of the Council.

SILCK staff shall include at least a full time Executive Director and one full time Administrative Assistant. SILCK currently contracts with an outside consultant / bookkeeper for accounting duties.

The comprehensive resource plan outlined below identifies the federal funds provided by KRS from Title VII-B, Ch. 1, (\$146,000). In addition to the Title VII-B funds, the SILCK will maintain its contract with Kansas Rehabilitation Services for administration and operation for \$100,000 / year (Title I pursuant to 34 C.F.R. 361.35).

The Resource Plan supports management and operation of the SILCK, including but not limited to, staff (executive director and administrative assistant), an independent office space as a not-for-profit, 501-c-3 organization, contractual services, educational activities, and travel costs and reasonable accommodations for members and staff. The SILCK is responsible to manage its budget. Kansas Rehabilitation services will maintain its obligation to oversight of VII B funds.

The above projected income is anticipated to remain consistent throughout the next three year period.

The resource plan was developed to support operational expenditures approved by the State Independent Living Council of Kansas. Funds for the plan will come from Title I and Title VII, Part B of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, State General Funds, and other federal, state and private funding sources.

As an independent organization, SILCK is responsible for management of its budget and any expenditures. The resource plan will support the Council's activities, including personnel, operating, and funding projects such as; demonstrating ways to expand and improve IL services, outreach to un-served or underserved populations, providing training regarding IL philosophy, conducting studies and analysis, developing model policies, etc. SILCK will continue to operate within the budget which is itemized in the table on page (23) during the period of implementation of the State plan.

SILCK was established as a separate not-for-profit entity under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue code. Although the Governor appoints its members, SILCK is independent in its management and activities.

SILCK's office is located in a high rise office building, separate from the DSU, in downtown Topeka, Kansas. The Kansas SILC board is responsible

to select and supervise its staff, establish and manage its budget and set and carryout priorities and activities.

The Executive Director shall attend all Executive Committee and Board meetings.

Kansas Rehabilitation Services is working to implement policies/monitoring protocol in order to ensure CILs have policies and procedures in place that ensure service providers include personnel specifically trained in the provision of IL services and support of centers.

"Kansas works to ensure that accessibility is a reality for all. All parties: SILCK , KRS, and CILs work together to see that materials are provided in an accessible format; this includes Braille, large print, audio tape, CD and other formats. All internet sites will meet or exceed accessibility guidelines, and multimedia designs will be made accessible. For meetings and live events language interpreters, including sign language interpreters and interpreters for those with limited English proficiency, will be provided as needed."

Kansas practices affirmative action in hiring and advancing in employment qualified individuals with significant disabilities. Kansas Rehabilitation

Services will build into the monitoring protocols a measure which looks at IL service providers employment and advancement of qualified individuals with significant disabilities to ensure they are being treated in a equitable fashion Referencing section 503 and 504 of the Act.

Kansas Rehabilitation Services is required to monitor the state's CILs as part of their responsibility as the DSU. RSA maintains its responsibility to monitor CIL compliance with standards and indicators for Title VII, Part C funded CILs.

6.2 Fiscal Control and Fund Accounting – 34 CFR 364.34

Kansas Rehabilitation Services developed and implemented monitoring protocols in the 2008-2010 state plan. In the current 2011-2013 plan All centers currently in receipt of federal part VIIB funds, or state funds will receive a onsite review. A review of each center will be accomplished once every State Plan period. Fiscal responsibility is an area of the monitoring process which will be addressed,. Currently independent auditor's reports are sent to the DSU and suggestions for corrective action are made in writing directly to the executive director of a CIL or SILC as needed. KRS will maintain appropriate fiscal control and fund accounting procedures to ensure the proper disbursement of and accounting for funds made available through part B of chapter 1 title VII of the Act in addition to complying with applicable EDGAR fiscal and accounting requirements. KRS will work to ensure all grantees utilize proper controls and accounting policy through on site visits and monitoring of centers.

6.3 Record-Keeping, Access and Reporting – 34 CFR 364.35; 34 CFR 364.36; 34 CFR 364.37

All applicable records are available to both state and federal auditors/reviewers. Federally funded CIL's continue to be responsible to develop and submit 704 reports as required. As necessary and allowable by HIPAA, individual CIL records are available to both state and federal auditors/reviewers.

CILs do not discriminate on the basis of age, color, creed, gender, national origin, race, religion of type of significant disability. There is no residence exclusion from IL services for anyone present in the state. CAP information is provided to every applicant by the center, in order to ensure compliance with the non-discrimination policy. Kansas Rehabilitation Services will also work to address this in monitoring protocols which are to be developed, and implemented prior to the submission of the next state plan.

Annual review of audited financial statement. The SILCK executive and finance committee will review the audited financial statements by the end of the first quarter. They will report the results at the spring full Council meeting.
